A reading from the book of Leviticus

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron, 'If a swelling or scab or shiny spot appears on a man's skin, a case of leprosy of the skin is to be suspected. The man must be taken to Aaron, the priest, or to one of the priests who are his sons.

'The man is leprous: he is unclean. The priest must declare him unclean; he is suffering from leprosy of the head. A man infected with leprosy must wear his clothing torn and his hair disordered; he must shield his upper lip and cry, "Unclean, unclean." As long as the disease lasts he must be unclean; and therefore he must live apart; he must live outside the camp.'

PARISH NOTICES

COVID-19 RESTRICITONS RELAXED for places of worship from Friday, 12 February. Two important restrictions now relaxed apply to us: there is no need to wear a face mask in Church and the 2 square metre rule now applies. This means that St. Patrick's capacity is 140 persons. Registering names, hand sanitising and keeping the required physical distancing is still required.

ASH WEDNESDAY - 17 FEBRUARY: Mass will be celebrated at 9:15am in the morning and 7:00pm at night. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The law of fasting binds those who are between the ages of 18 and 60. The law of abstinence binds those who are over 14.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS DURING LENT: Will be held every Tuesday night at 7:00pm throughout Lent commencing Tuesday, 23 February up to and including Tuesday, 30 March of Holy Week. These will follow our usual format with an extra Biblical reading and time for quiet prayer and reflection. The 7:00pm Mass will not be celebrated on the Tuesdays of Lent as the pre-recorded following Sunday Mass will be celebrated earlier in the day. Parishioners are welcome to attend the pre-recorded Mass but should check with the Parish Office for the time. On Tuesday, 16 February the time is 12:00pm (noon).

PROJECT COMPASSION THROUGHOUT LENT: Available at the back of the Church are money boxes, which are to be returned at the end of Lent, and Lenten Sharepack's which contain envelopes for your weekly donation, to be placed on any collection plate, throughout the six weeks of Lent. JOSEPINE **BAKHITA** PATRON SAINT OF SUDAN AND TRAFFICKED PEOPLE: St. Josepine Bakhita, was born in Southern Sudan in Kidnapped and sold into slavery at the age of seven by Arab slave traders, this Sudanese child (her original name is not known) received name Bakhita. the "fortunate," from meaning her captors. Bakhita passed through

five brutal owners, one of whom had her tattooed over her entire body, sparing only her face. After enduring years of cruelty and hardship as a slave in the human markets of El Obeid and Khartoum, Sudan, she was purchased by an Italian Consul, Callisto Legnani, who emancipated her. He showed her for the first time in many years genuine compassion, warmth, and dignity. When Legnani departed Sudan, Bakhita asked permission to go with him, eventually entering into the care of a family as a nanny and then the Canossian Sisters of the Institute of Catechumens in Venice.

It was while with the Sisters that Bakhita first came to learn about God and had her first in-depth exposure to Catholicism. She had already experienced the Lord in her life, "without knowing who he was." Under the care of the Canossian Sisters, she received a formal catechetical education and was baptised in January of 1890, receiving the new name of Josephine. She then requested permission to enter the Canossian Sisters, taking final vows in 1896. For the next 50 years she laboured for the congregation and was especially beloved as the doorkeeper of the community, giving comfort and help to the many poor and sick who came to the institute for help.

In her final years she was often ill, but no one ever heard her complain. When asked how she was feeling she replied, "As the Master desires." On her deathbed she became delirious and thought she was a slave again; she cried, "Please loosen the chains! They are heavy!" Bakhita never lost faith in Divine Providence. Even at the end of her life, she was asked if she was ready to go to heaven. She replied, "I neither wish to go nor to stay. God knows where to find me when he wants me." Saint Josephine Bakhita died 8 February 1947.

Human trafficking of men, women and children is a global issue that requires international collaboration to address the personal circumstances of those who are abused and at risk, as well as addressing the structural causes of this evil. Trafficking exists here in Australia.

The United Nations estimates that one in every three victims of trafficking is a child. It is estimated that 30 million children have lost their childhood through sexual exploitation over the past 30 years.

Pope Francis calls on everyone to commit themselves to work for the freedom of all who are exploited and enslaved. He invites us to join with him in a prayer to the Saint:

O Saint Josephine Bakhita, assist all those who are entrapped in slavery.

Intercede with the God of mercy on their behalf, so that the chains of their captivity will be broken.
