**GOSPEL ACCLAMATION: PHILIPPIANS 2:15-16** 


Alleluia, alleluia! Shine on the world like bright stars; you are offering it the word of life. Alleluia! THE GOSPEL: LUKE 6:39-45

## PARISH NOTICES

SEASON OF LENT: As we know, Lent is a period of preparation and fasting. It likely has been observed before the Easter festival since apostolic times, though the practice was not formalized until the First Council of Nicaea in 325 AD. It was a time of preparation of candidates for baptism and a time of penance for grievous sinners who were excluded from Communion and were preparing for their restoration. As a sign of their penitence, they wore sackcloth and were sprinkled with ashes. This form of public penance began to die out in the 9th century, and it became customary for all the faithful to be reminded of the need for penitence by receiving an imposition of ashes on their foreheads on the first day of Lent — hence the name Ash Wednesday. In Western churches Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, six and a half weeks before Easter, and provides for a 40-day fast (Sundays are excluded), in imitation of Jesus Christ's fasting in the wilderness before he began his public ministry. In Eastern churches Lent begins on the Monday of the seventh week before Easter and ends on the Friday that is nine days before Easter. This 40-day "Great Lent" includes Saturdays and Sundays as relaxed fast days (cf Encyclopaedia Britanica).

"Christians must always live this way, without any wish to come down from their Cross – otherwise they will sink beneath the world's mire. But if we have to do so all our lives, we must make even a greater effort during the days of Lent. It is not a simple matter of living through forty days. Lent is the epitome of our whole life". – St. Augustine, Sermon 205.

**SACRAMENT OF PENANCE** will resume from Saturday, 5 March — 4:30pm–5:15pm in the Confessional Room. Celebration of the Sacrament in this location had to be suspended during COVID due to the impossibility of required distancing protocols.

**EUCHARISTIC ADORATION** will resume again after an absence of almost two years due to the pandemic. From now on Adoration will be on Fridays, beginning on Friday, 4 March, after the 9:15am Mass, for one hour, concluding with Benediction. This hour will be a quiet time of prayer and reflection. It is appropriate that Adoration is resuming at the beginning of Lent. Together with the Stations of the Cross on Friday evenings, these liturgies can be seen as integral to our Lenten prayer and discipline.

**ASH WEDNESDAY - 2 MARCH:** Mass will be celebrated at 9:15am in the morning and 7:00pm at night. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The law of fasting binds those who are between the ages of 18 and 60. The law of abstinence binds those who are over 14.

**STATIONS OF THE CROSS DURING LENT:** Will be held every Friday night at 6:30pm throughout Lent commencing Friday, 4 March and concluding on Friday, 8 April.

**LEGION OF MARY:** Invites you to the Rosary Cenacle every Thursday morning at 8:15am to pray for the sick, Holy Souls, the dying and Priests. Please join us as the world needs more prayer.

Following advice from both the Parish Pastoral Council and the Finance Committee to install this new donation point, it will be available for use at the weekend Masses, at least initially. The donation is pre-programmed for \$5.00 per tap of the card over the tap symbol. If you wish to donate more than \$5.00, tap again. It takes a few seconds to record your donation. The Diocese's encouragement to use this facility is a response to the trend where most people carry little, if any, cash these days. The donation point does not take the place of the First and Second collections or the weekly envelope offerings.
