LITURGY OF THE WORD THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY AND JOSEPH – YEAR B



1ST READING: GENESIS 15:1-6. 21:1-3 A reading from the book of Genesis

The word of the Lord was spoken to Abram in a vision, 'Have no fear, Abram, I am your shield; your reward will be very great'. 'My Lord,' Abram replied 'what do you intend to give me? I go childless.' Then Abram said, 'See, you have given me no descendants; some man of my household will be my heir'. And then this word of the Lord was spoken to him, 'He shall not be your heir; your heir shall be of your own flesh and blood'. Then taking him outside he said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can. Such will be your descendants' he told him. Abram put his faith in the Lord, who counted this as making him justified. The Lord dealt kindly with Sarah as he had said, and did what he had promised her. So Sarah conceived and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the time God had promised. Abraham named the son born to him Isaac, the son to whom Sarah had given birth.

Response: The Lord remembers his covenant for ever.

2ND READING: HEBREWS 11:8. 11-12. 17-19 A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore. It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead; and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

THE GOSPEL: LUKE 2:22-40

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

When the day came for them to be purified as laid down by the Law of Moses, the parents of Jesus took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord - observing what stands written in the Law of the Lord: Every first-born male must be consecrated to the Lord - and also to offer in sacrifice, in accordance with what is said in the Law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to Israel's comforting and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had set eyes on the Christ of the Lord. Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the Law required, he took him into his arms and blessed God; and he said: 'Now, Master, you can let your servant go in peace, just as you promised; because my eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared for all the nations to see, a light to enlighten the pagans and the glory of your people Israel.' As the child's father and mother stood there wondering at the things that were being said about him, Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'You see this child: he is destined for the fall and for the rising of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected - and a sword will pierce your own soul too - so that the secret thoughts of many may be laid bare.' There was a prophetess also, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well on in years. Her days of girlhood over, she had been married for seven years before becoming a widow. She was now eighty-four years old and never left the Temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayer. She came by just at that moment and began to praise God; and she spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem. When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required, they went back to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. Meanwhile the child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.

PARISH NOTICES

In his Christmas Day Sermon (189) St. Augustine (354-430), Bishop of Hippo, North Africa said:

'And so let His mercy come to be in our hearts. His mother bore Him in her womb; let us bear Him in our hearts. The virgin was big with the incarnation of Christ; let our bosoms grow big with the faith of Christ. She gave birth to the Saviour; let us give birth to praise. We mustn't be barren; our souls must be fruitful with God.'

Augustine is making reference to the physical features of Mary as she carried Jesus in her womb. This leads us to ponder on what kind of young woman (probably aged twelve) Mary was in her faith and love of God. Augustine encourages his congregation to be people who are full of faith in God, comparing such faith to being big hearted and proud. Just as we feast materially on Christmas Day, equally, or even more, let us be people who are rich in the fruitful graces of God.

Another year of pilgrimage has almost gone. It has been a challenging year of pilgrimage as we were hit by COVID-19. It is clearly not over yet. At Church we have met the various restrictions on movement and numbers. By and large, we have done this positively, mainly due to concern expressed by the second of the Great Commandments: love of neighbour. Even so, as a parish family, post-lockdown from the end of May, we have gathered each Sunday at the tables of the Word and the Eucharist to be fed and nourished for our journey to our heavenly homeland. We have farewelled only a few members of our parish family and pray they spend eternity with the Lord. We have welcomed a few new members through the Sacrament of Baptism. We have provided for the spiritual needs of some through our participation in the Sacraments (Penance, Eucharist, Anointing of the Sick). We have tried to be good people by the way we treat others we know and do not know. We readily acknowledge that none of us is perfect. We seek the forgiveness of God and others and do our best to extend that forgiveness to those whom we have hurt

On Christmas Day we celebrate with exultant joy and praise the God who came among us as one of us. As Augustine would say, let our hearts be big with His mercy. We celebrate also with those whom we love: family and friends. Our family is the Church we have at home. We cherish Christ in the midst of our Church. Let us cherish Christ in the midst of our family too.

PASTORAL LETTER TO THE PEOPLE OF PARRAMATTA DURING THE CORONAVIRUS CRISIS AND CHRISTMAS 2020

Dear sisters and brothers in Christ

Before the news about the COVID-19 cluster appearing in the Northern Beaches of Sydney came out, many of us were feeling a little more confident that we might have put the worst of the pandemic restrictions behind us.

Since our churches are now subject to the 4 metre square rule, the number of faithful that can attend church is, again, limited. For some of our parishes, this number remains relatively few compared to pre-pandemic numbers. Some of our large capacity churches can increase their numbers.

It was on 20th March 2020 that I decreed that, in accordance with Canons 85 and 87, Catholics are dispensed from their Sunday obligation to attend Mass (Canon 1247). This decree remains in force and will do so for the foreseeable future.

I shall await advice from the health authorities and the NSW Government before rescinding this decree. The obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation (Each Sunday, the Feast of the Assumption and Christmas Day in Australia) is fully explained in the Catechism of the Catholic Church (2180-2188).

At this time, the course of how the pandemic will affect us throughout Australia is still unclear. However, there are signs that we as a nation have successfully beaten the worst ravages of this new virus. We can be a bit more confident about social interaction. Therefore, I would encourage you to attend Masses at your local churches or wherever you normally worship as we enter the Christmas season.

We all know how much the celebration of the Eucharist means to nurturing our faith at the best of times. Even at these pandemic times, I suggest you think about returning to Mass each Sunday.

However, if you still feel in any way vulnerable or unsafe in returning to your parish church, then stay at home. You have probably accessed the many offerings online of the celebration of the Eucharist. These are still available.

Remember that the Eucharist is firstly about our community's expression of faith and love for God and in each other. To support this belief, we apply the obligation to attend whenever and wherever possible.

I wish you all a very happy and holy Christmas in the company of the God who values us, his people, so much that he sent his only Son as our brother and Redeemer in the blessed and helpless baby Jesus of Bethlehem.
